O Lord, our Heavenly Father, hear us as we pray in faith. At this time of expectation and excitement, grant us a moment's solitude, in which to contemplate the enormity of your coming to Earth in human form.

Help them to remember the good and positive aspects of their lives, and grant them peace of mind.

Maranatha. Amen. Come, Lord Jesus. Lord, on this Eve of Christmas, we pray that your healing spirit will fall on those known to us, who are in any way dis-eased, whether in body, mind or spirit. On those anticipating hospital treatment and on those *recuperating* from such treatment.
